BLUEPRINTS RECOMMENDATIONS

The Academy's efforts on the Hill to implement recommendations from the Blueprints for a More Modern Diplomatic Service report are finally producing some small but hopeful results.

On March 30, Congresswoman Dina Titus (D-NV), together with Congressman Michael Baumgartner (R-WA), introduced a bipartisan bill, H.R. 8167, "To amend the Foreign Service Act of 1980 to establish a Diplomatic Reserve Corps." After its introduction, Congressman Joe Wilson (R-SC) also added his co-sponsorship to the bill. HFAC Majority is also supportive of the Diplomatic Reserve Corps (DRC) concept and continues to consult with the Academy as they work with the State Department on the particulars of the DRC pilot concept.

In parallel, the Academy is working with both Majority and Minority staff on SFRC to include the DRC language in their State Authorization process this year. At State, the Undersecretary for Management is supportive, although not in a position to make a definitive commitment.

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First Academy Press Briefing

On March 19, the Academy hosted several journalists for a press briefing on the crisis management protocols of the State Department during the escalation in the Middle East, specifically Iran. The panel, organized by Media Committee co-chairs Yael Lempert and Michael Ratney and Action Group members including John Feeley, consisted of AAD members John Bass, Jeffrey Feltman, Yael Lempert, Elizabeth Richard, and Aline Romanowski. We had journalists representing the Wall Street Journal, CNN, Associated Press, ABC News, Bloomberg News, Univision, Reuters, Politico, Crooked Media, Foreign Policy, Al Arabiya, Al Jazeera, PBS Newshour, and Channel 4 News. Associated Press and SBS News published stories with context from the briefing. Following the briefing, Assistant Secretary for the Bureau of Global Public Affairs, Dylan Johnson, made a series of posts disparaging AAD members. Both [AAD](#) and [AFSA](#) issued statements in response to those attacks.

Foreign Service Day 2026

On May 1, the Academy joined the American Foreign Service Association in marking Foreign Service Day. For the first time in its history, the Memorial Plaque Ceremony was not held at the Department of State. AAD joined AFSA outside the Department for an unofficial ceremony. Attendees reflected on the USAID Memorial Wall and honored their USAID colleagues whose names will be added.

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FOREIGN SERVICE ACT REWRITE

In addition to implementing the Blueprints recommendations, the Academy has been closely involved in HFAC Chairman Mast's effort to rewrite the Foreign Service Act of 1980. In preparation for this effort, the Academy put together a short list of items from the original Act that, in the Academy's view, are essential and must remain in the new Act. The Academy has also been watching to ensure that the diversity language and the Foreign Service union's legal status are preserved and that no poison pills are introduced into the new Act as part of this process.

The original plan for a full-scale rewrite has been replaced by a smaller targeted effort. So far, we have succeeded in preserving the authority of the Director General and other matters. We do not see any provisions that would pose serious risks to effective diplomacy. HFAC Majority staff wants a truly bipartisan effort and values working with the Academy to facilitate that.

Earlier in the year, the Academy convened two "Four Corners" briefings for the SFRC and HFAC Majority and Minority staffs, who appreciated the chance for a bipartisan discussion and the opportunity to ask for AAD's views on various issues. Since then, the Academy commented on two detailed legislative drafts. Our comments have produced change. The process continues.

TITLE I—THE FOREIGN SERVICE OF THE UNITED STATES

CHAPTER 1—GENERAL PROVISIONS

SEC. 101. [22 U.S.C. 3901] FINDINGS AND OBJECTIVES.—(a) The Congress finds that—

(1) a career foreign service, characterized by excellence and professionalism, is essential in the national interest to assist the President and the Secretary of State in conducting the foreign affairs of the United States;

(2) the scope and complexity of the foreign affairs of the Nation have heightened the need for a professional foreign service that will serve the foreign affairs interests of the United States in an integrated fashion and that can provide a resource of qualified personnel for the President, the Secretary of State, and the agencies concerned with foreign affairs;

(3) the Foreign Service of the United States, established under the Act of May 24, 1924 (commonly known as the Rogers Act) and continued by the Foreign Service Act of 1946, must be preserved, strengthened, and improved in order to carry out its mission effectively in response to the complex challenges of modern diplomacy and international relations;

(4) the members of the Foreign Service should be representative of the American people, aware of the principles and history of the United States and informed of current concerns and trends in American life, knowledgeable of the affairs, cultures, and languages of other countries, and available to serve in assignments throughout the world; and

(5) the Foreign Service should be operated on the basis of merit principles.

(b) The objective of this Act is to strengthen and improve the Foreign Service of the United States by—

(1) assuring, in accordance with merit principles, admission through impartial and rigorous examination, acquisition of career status only by those who have demonstrated their fitness through successful completion of probationary assignments, effective career development, advancement and retention of the ablest, and separation of those who do not meet the requisite standards of performance;

(2) fostering the development and vigorous implementation of policies and procedures, including affirmative action programs, which will facilitate and encourage (A) entry into and advancement in the Foreign Service by persons from all segments of American society, and (B) equal opportunity and fair and equitable treatment for all without regard to political affiliation, race, color, religion, national origin, sex, marital status, age, or disability;

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OUTREACH PROGRAMS

University Outreach Programs

Between the end of 2025 and the first half of 2026, the Academy continued to implement its recurring outreach programs at several universities.

On November 21, 2025, AAD held its annual conference at Monticello, titled ***Representing a Nation: The Making of a Diplomat***. The discussion featured AAD members Carol Perez, Alonzo Fulgham, James Jeffrey, and Ron Neumann. The keynote address was delivered by Marc Grossman. The event was well-attended, including by many University of Virginia Center for Politics students, who also joined the speakers for a roundtable luncheon prior to the conference. For the first time, the conference included a panel moderated by a UVA student, Sophia Bangura.

On January 23, 2026, AAD member Chris Henzel traveled to Indiana University's Hamilton Lugar School of Global and International Studies for a day of discussions on diplomacy and global security as part of the **Academy's outreach program to promote the episodes of *The General and the Ambassador Podcast***. The program included talks on "What Really Happens When Diplomacy Meets War: Lessons from Yemen" and "Shifting Alliances in the Gulf and their Implications from the Middle East to New York."

On February 24, 2026, AAD members Deborah McCarthy, Kathleen Stephens, Philip Reeker, and Ron Neumann traveled to Georgia Southern University for the inaugural **Georgia Southern University Ambassadors Forum**. The panel met with students and community members and discussed how to "better understand current events and how effective diplomacy can positively position the United States."

International Leadership of Texas

On February 27, 2026, the Academy welcomed yet another student cohort from the International Leadership of Texas (ILTexas) public charter schools, who were in DC for a weeklong leadership and career development program. Thirty-six high school seniors spent half a day at the Academy and met with AAD members Ricardo Zúñiga, Richard Hoagland, Greta Holtz, and John Tefft. Each presentation was followed by a Q&A session, during which the students discussed current foreign policy issues and received advice on pursuing careers in diplomacy. They eagerly joined in the discussions of foreign affairs.

Academy Social Media Presence

At the start of 2026, the Academy renewed its presence on TikTok. In keeping with our mission to strengthen U.S. diplomacy, we are now producing short-form vertical video content posted on TikTok, Instagram, Facebook, and YouTube to be shared with young people, targeting late high school and early college students.
